#### **Platinum Jubilee**

Queen Elizabeth II's accession day is on 6th February and this year we look forward to the Platinum Jubilee celebrations later in June. Ten years ago BBC South East commissioned a unique photo mosaic entitled The People's Monarch to commemorate the Queen's Dia-

mond Jubilee; the mosaic features two images of the Queen – a 2012 view and one from 1952 – and comprises more than five thousand pictures submitted by viewers of family celebrations for the Silver Jubilee earlier in 1977.

Mike Rowe sent in a snapshot of a family group taken in the summer of 1977 when his elder son had made a crown at play group to celebrate the Silver Jubilee. The picture was accepted and is included in the right hand image of the Queen just below the bright glint in her left eye; Mike and his family went to see the mosaic when it went on display in Rochester Cathedral.

The mosaic is now on permanent display at Gatwick airport where arriving

travellers can see it on their way to the baggage hall. So, if any of you are venturing abroad this year, keep a watch out for it on your return. Were any other of our U3A members lucky enough to have their own pictures included in the mosaic? I wonder – let us know.

ast year I volunteered to give a talk on Zoom for our U3A Poetry Group on poets who have been inspired by Cambridge and its College gardens. I had been given for my birthday in May a wonderfully illustrated book on the gardens of the Oxford and Cambridge colleges-almost 90 in total. I wanted to see them for myself and survey where Thomas Gray, Ted Hughes, Milton, Byron, Coleridge had their youthful poetic walks. So on the 5th July

2021, a fine summer's day, my daughter and granddaughter and I set off. Outside the hotel where we parked was a life size ceramic cow called' MOOre Gin Please'. It was coloured blue and had a pattern of the botanical elements that go into gin making – lemon, dandelion, thyme, juniper etc. We had come during the first week of the 'Cows at Cambridge' Open Air exhibition. We were diverted in more ways than one. There were 50 cows dotted about the city and we tried to see all the ones closest to the centre. One was 'Hey Diddle Diddle' with the picture of a

night sky with the cat and the fiddle and a cow clearing the moon. 'May-Belle' was Kings College Chapel and punting at a may ball. 'Udders and Rudders' was completed covered in rowing blades of many different hues. Our favourite was Sir Isaac Mooton with the great man's head and wig and an apple falling on him and the Royal Mint. We followed the cattle trail through the city neglecting the gardens apart from Queens' and St Catharine's. The latter has

a delightful profuse wild garden and is the home of the buddleia named after Revd Buddle sometime chaplain there. In September the cows were auctioned for charity, raising over £250,000. I had hoped to bid for the cow called 'Buttercup' which was a merry mixture of yellow and green but did not remember in time. The lowing herd has wound slowly o'er the lea but they have left the gardens immaculate.

#### On the Cusp by David Kynaston

We all lived through the 1960s and this book, which is the latest title in Kynaston's social history of post-war Britain, looks back at 1962. The author suggests that the '60s really began on 5th October 1962, the day which saw

both the release of the Beatles's first single, Love Me Do, and the premiere of Dr. No, the first Bond film. He provides a snapshot of life in that pivotal year using diaries, social surveys, anecdotes, newspapers and commentary.


