
Jenny Froude ~ 'Words Are Not Enough' How signing makes sense of a silent world

Our speaker this month is Jenny Froude, a journalist on Woman's Weekly for 12 years before a long-awaited family arrived. New communication skills were needed when deafness was the price five-month-old Tom paid for overcoming meningitis. Rejoicing in his survival and undaunted by the disability his family discovered that to savour the life that had been spared he would need signs to make sense of a silent world. says it was a steep but 'lovely' learning curve as she started to sign with him. Later she contributed to the LBB's Marathon Sign Dictionaries and spent several years as an SSA in a Senior Hearing Impairment Unit.

Her Book Making Sense in Sign in the Parents' and Teachers' Guide Series was published 20 years ago and continues to be of immense benefit to all those who have to cope with this disability.

"This book", writes the Rt Hon Lord Ashley of Stoke, "is a letter of love and faith from a woman whose son's deafness at first overwhelmed then inspired her".

We're in for a fascinating afternoon!

From our Treasurer


Our finances for financial year 2022/23 are in a good state – with a loss in the year of only £197 which can easily be covered by our reserves.

The two pie-charts illustrate the main elements of our Income and Expenditure. On the Income side you can see that subscriptions (at only £12 per annum) make up the vast majority of our income. Gift Aid then adds a useful contribution (from those members who have agreed to Gift Aid their membership fees where 25% is added by the taxman) – currently only 80% of members do this – could you do this too? – it doesn't cost you anything. Other income is derived from tea/coffee donations and from Riviera Travel who donate a percentage of your Riviera holiday to our u3a funds.

On the Expenditure side you will notice that almost a half of our income is spent on the unavoidable charges such as the Capitation fee to the u3a Trust, the cost of Third Age Matters magazine, Beacon - the u3a national database which is necessary for all of our administration and licences. Once those items are paid for we use the remainder for our monthly speakers, hire of Ryarsh Village Hall, our website and administration.

We do hold more than the recommended level of reserves, and it is for this reason that we have been able to maintain our membership fee at £12 for some years knowing that any shortfall can be paid for from those reserves. However, there will come a time where this will no longer be possible and our membership fee will then have to increase. That point has not been reached yet so let's be thankful and enjoy the many benefits our £12 gives us annually!

The politics of the day is large on the agenda but there is no limit to what members can suggest. We don't always stick to the list of suggestions; whatever feels right on the day.


There is always a wide range of political opinions which often makes for a lively discussion, but we always respect each other's views.
